1800-1850

- Romanticism was influenced by emotion, nature, individuality, mystery, imagination, tragedy, and rebellion.
- It was created to break away from the limits of Neoclassicism. Instead of being confined to clean lines they used less precision, loose brushwork, and emotion to drive their artistic expression.
- The Industrial Revolution inspired Romanticism by giving them respect for nature and a yearning for simplicity.
- It was also a reaction to The Enlightenment



"THE SLAVE SHIP" BY J.M.W.TURNER (1840)

- At first glance it is simply a beautiful painting but as the eye moves downward the warm fuzziness is replaced with a tense feeling that only increases as you realize there are hands reaching out of the water.
- The lines of the boat give a strong and tall appearance while the blurry, curved lines of the water give the piece a soft, kinetic, and aggressive feeling.
- Turner uses the lines of the boat to lead your eye to the white line of the sun, which leads to the hands in the water.
- He used a single-split complementary color palette of blues, yellow oranges, and red oranges.
- Turner also demonstrates great use of texture and scale in this piece.



"THE RAVEN" BY EDGAR ALLAN POE

- Poe is a prime example of an American Romanticism writer
- The poem holds deep emotion while he speaks of his lost love, Lenore
- There is mystery in who is tapping on the door and he lets his imagination run wild
- Each of these elements come together to bring the same feelings as a Romanticism painting would

- Preault incorporated vertical and horizontal lines to create the appearance of being strong, masculine, and dynamic.
- He achieved three dimensional texture throughout the sculpture
