

CUBISM

The style of Cubism is thought to have developed at the beginning of the 20th century (1907). One of the main facets of this style is the idea of showing the same subject from multiple angles. The style was also characterized by a lack of traditional perspective and realism

The creation of the style was attributed to Picasso's Les Demoiselles d'Avignon (1907), shown to the right.

CUBISM

There were two main styles of Cubism. The first stage was Analytic Cubism (1908-1912). It was characterized by multiple viewpoints and a lack of vibrant colors, this was meant to draw attention to the form of the artwork.

The second stage was Synthetic Cubism (1912-1914). It differed from Analytic Cubism in that the shape were simpler and the colors were more vibrant. They also incorporated more real-world elements.



INFLUENCES

• Cubism was practiced primarily between (1907-1914) and was influenced by Primitivism and non-Western styles. Picasso's painting, Les Demoiselles d'Avignon(1907), which is attributed to creating the style, was influenced by African styles of art. Cubism took the Renaissance ideal of perspective and threw it out the window
